



DISTRICT + MAP




The West Gervais Street Commercial District developed over a number of years as a mixed residential and transportation area with a myriad of train tracks and warehouses. The area transformed around the turn of the twentieth century, gaining retail buildings and losing residential ones. With the earliest railroad dating to the early 1840s, the earliest historic building dating to around 1846 and a heyday of commercial construction that continued into the 1930s, this area represents a commercial and warehouse district distinct from the city's historic retail business area along Main Street. The West Gervais Street Commercial District was listed in the National Register of Historic Places in 1983 and was designated a local Historic Commercial District in 1994.

Did you know?? The West Gervais Commercial District was re-branded as "The Congaree Vista" in the 1980s as part of a larger effort to revitalize the area. Revitalization efforts from the City involved investing in large projects to revamp the area including burying power lines and the railroad tracks for a more pedestrian friendly experience along the street.

3	This building, built in 1904, with original cast iron pilasters is the last remaining Richland County liquor dispensary building.

4	This building was built in 1907 for the J.E. Young Company Wholesale Fruit and Produce Company.
	ADDRESS:
5	This large galvanized metal warehouse, built ca. 1900, is part of the district's only manufacturing complex.
	ADDRESS:
6	This building was built in 1916 as the B.B. Kirkland Distributing Company warehouse and outlet store.
	ADDRESS:
7	This brick building, topped by a modelled brick parapet, was built in 1910 as a wholesale sundries store.
	ADDRESS:
8	This building was constructed as a one story building in 1910 and expanded to two stories in 1919.
	ADDRESS:
9	This building, with Flemish-bond brickwork and metal pilasters and colonnettes, was built in 1902 as a hardware and grocery store. ADDRESS:
1 0	This three story building was constructed in 1919 for the DuPre Motor Company, a Ford automobile dealership.

11	This building, built in 1935 for the Goodyear Tire Company, retains its original corbeled brick arcade detailing along the
